

Moss Bluff Part A includes Early History, Seminole Indian History, Natural History, Early Settlers, Old Roads, Boating on the Ocklawaha, Warehouses, Canals, Locks, Power Plant, Ferries and Draw Bridges, Schools, Ecclesiastical, Industries, Cemeteries and Burial Plots and Historical Items, Post Offices and Post Masters, Merchants, Accidents, Fires, Crime, Residences plus many more topics.

Also included are “The Tourist Crop” or as we say today “Snowbirds”.

On pages 49 and 50 are the Roman numerals assigned to 24 roads. It is necessary for the reader to refer to these pages to understand the locations referenced in the chapter of Present and Former Houses. The Arabic numerals were assigned to each house or point of interest on these roads. The first paragraph on page 51 is an excellent example on how to interpret the system the author used in this book.
